After the deadline (31-07-2013), the director sent at judge all studies without the names of the authors.


I thank all participants of this tournament. Special thanks to Christer Jonsson for their collaboration to act as judge, who has performed his assignment with remarkable dedication.

I received 83 H# anonymous from Mario. 41 H#2, 27 H#2.5-3 and 15 H#>3. The quality was high. I propose the following award:




As far as I know, this is the first time we see 4 Albino's mates without promoted pieces or twinning. A real good performance with model mates.
